

## The Celebration Ceremony of the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Project Mingde and the 22<sup>nd</sup> Working Trip to Guangxi (16<sup>th</sup> – 21<sup>st</sup> October 2014)

On Oct 16, while the setting sun shed light on the railway track to Guilin, our journey began. After 18 hours of travelling by train and shuttle bus, we finally arrived at the hotel in Rongshui and started our first task — packing gifts for the children.

The following day, we went to Dabao Village with Dr. George Wong to do some measurements and to check strength of the concrete walls and columns. We could apply knowledge learnt from the laboratory sessions in the University. In the afternoon, we were invited by the principal Mr. Luo to enjoy our lunch at his home and we all had a great time.

Building to have lunch with the local students and to communicate with them. Hours later, we got on the shuttle bus to Guilin to take the train to Hong Kong. And the whole trip ended.
